1. What connects these three places?

Hall Farm Buckingham Palace Jewry Wall

Answer: They are all Grade 1 listed buildings. Less than 3% of the country's listed buildings are Grade 1

6. What connects these three Newbold Verdon Primary School football seasons?

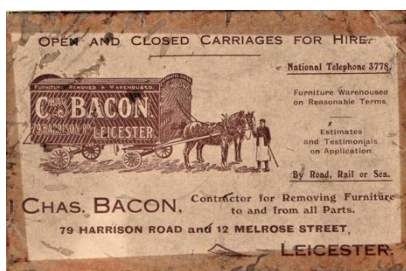
1955/6 1959/60 1960/61

Answer: In about 1700, Hall Farm (NEWBOLD HALL) was commissioned to be built by Nathaniel Lord Crewe Bishop of Durham and was looked after on behalf of his lordship from 1712-1721 by Ralph Trotter the man who commissioned the building of Chater Farm, destined to be owned by the Trotter family for the next 243 years.
